#### The Monthly Message—February 2023

Even if you know nothing about Saints, you will have heard of this one: Saint Valentine. He is remembered in Anglican and Roman Catholic churches on the 14<sup>th</sup> of this month, which is the day he was martyred in Rome around 269. It is believed he was a priest or bishop, ministering to persecuted Christians. There are several stories or legends that mention Valentine, and it may be that he is the Valentine who during the reign of Claudius refused to denounce his Christian faith. On the evening before he was put to death, he supposedly wrote a note and signed off with the words 'From your Valentine'.

Valentine's Day has become rather commercialised, but the principle of sending a message to those we love and care about still stands today. Nowadays, the focus of Valentine's Day is on romantic love between partners, but there are many different kinds of love, and words or tokens of appreciation for and recognition of the love in friendship or kinship never go amiss, not just on Valentine's Day but any day of the year.

When we first fall in love, we only see the other person's good sides: their humour, their beauty, the way their eyes light up, the thoughtful and loving things they do and say. Then, over time, we find out that they can also be moody, inconsiderate, argumentative, just like us, as we too let go of our 'best behaviour at all times'. The 'honeymoon phase' is over... and love doesn't seem so easy now... But if we manage to keep loving each other through all the ups and downs in life, then love becomes stronger and somehow more dense and present. It may be less visible, we may not bring each other flowers or little cards or other tokens as often as we did in the beginning of the relationship, but it's 'there' and hopefully 'there to stay'.

The Bible has a lot to say about love. We may know this passage from the first letter to the Corinthians, which is often read at weddings: 'Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.'

Or this one from the letter to the Romans: 'I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.'

Does love feel like that to you? How would you describe it?

May love be present in your life, and may you find peace and blessings this month,

BCC means Blind Carbon Copy. That way you do not circulate everyone's email address. I have had several examples of this and it can mean serious scam problems if your computer is hacked. I have had 3 of these this week! If the email does not look right—Delete it!. UNDER GDPR it is illegal to circulate other people's email addresses. Stay Safe.

#### Parish News Update.

On Wednesday evening I took part in an online DEFRA seminar which included control and responsibilities of everything from ditches to muck heaps and everything in between. On Thursday evening, I attended Flood Wardens meeting at the Borough Council offices where we received a presentation by an officer from the new Severn Trent River Watch Initiative. Driven by the recent Media coverage of Sewage and pollution infiltration, there is now a real drive to clean up our watercourses. Severn Trent are attempting to provide a "Blue Flag" system for local rivers. It will—no doubt—be an uphill struggle—I mentioned the dreadful pollution from the Motorway drainage. Oil, tyre rubber and spillage pours down our local streams when it rains and this needs sorting as well. Those who note things will see that the pumping station at Tredington has been attended by a tanker during the last week. Apparently there has been a blockage in the Rising Main adjacent to the entrance to the Solar Farm which is preventing the pumps working. PLEASE REMEMBER-DO NOT PUT WET WIPES-NAPPIES- or SIMILAR PADs down the LOO! IT BLOCKS the SYSTEM!!!!!

#### Richard's Ramblings.

Last week, I was updating my Short History of Stoke Orchard and went online to find when Cleeve Station - by the Tip entrance—closed. I was quite surprised to read that passenger services were

still in place up to 1950 but the goods sidings were still in use for freight right up to 1960. In railways terms that is still quite recent. The main line from Birmingham to Gloucester opened in stages from 1840 and as reported, the Bishops Cleeve freight sid-



ings were used in early days for the export of farm cider to Birmingham, Bristol and all points between.

However, This part of Gloucestershire was served by so many branch lines we enjoyed fantastic service. Cheltenham and Ashchurch were



real railway hubs sadly now lost. As you can see by this old map of Ashchurch, two main branch lines ran off the main line. The one to the right went to Birmingham— Barnt Green, via Beckford, Evesham, and Stratford on Avon. The one to the left was for Tewkesbury, (two stations—High Street opposite Quay Street and the main line up station road.) That line

crossed the Avon, through the tunnel under the Mythe crossed the Severn just south of Upton and on to Malvern. On the Ashchurch map

you will see a red circle on the freight sidings. These sidings service the Custard Factory which later became a Dowty unit. At the end of the sidings was a Dowty test facility for Hy-



draulic Buffers. For many years Princess Elizabeth—6201—



seen here approaching Bozards Crossing in 24th March 2012—Dowty's Apprentices overhauled the running gear. The old Water tower still remains—an echo of the halcyon days of steam locos.



Cheltenham of course was another hub close to Cleeve Station. As can be seen by this 1910 map, the main line passes through Lansdown Road station—as it did from the start in 1842. However, one can see at the right of the mainline was the Honeybourne line which also went to Birmingham and was often used as a relief line for goods trains. In 1968 when the mainline was blocked at Ashchurch by the de-railment of a

coal train—all services used that line. Now as a relief the only way is via Newport, Hereford and Shrewsbury. The Honeybourne line is now the GWRS Heritage Railway. Here, Dinmore Manor and King Edward II double head an excursion



leaving The Racecourse station bound for Broadway, via Winchcombe and Toddington. I have driven Dinmore Manor!! - thought I would get that in!! (Signed photos available!!)

Starting at St James Station (where Waitrose is now—see the big red



circle) this was the Terminus for the Cheltenham Spa Express— Cheltenham to London Paddington—in its day the fastest regular passenger service in Britain. This photo taken by me in around 1957 when I was at school in Stonehouse.

Also leaving St James Station were trains bound for Southampton. The original plan for a direct

line from Manchester to Southampton, was proposed in 1846 but due to financial pressure was voted out in Parliament. The line from Cheltenham curled around through Leckhampton, Charlton Kings (Pilley Bridge) and up to Andoversford. Here it turned south to Cirencester and Swindon. On then to Marlborough and Andover where it joined the line through Stockbridge, Romsey and Southampton Central. Thence in to the docks and ended at the Ocean Terminal. In a future "Rambling" I will come back to this line—nicknamed the Spratt and Winkle—, it was the direct Boat Train from Cheltenham!
