Dear All,

Welcome to my first summary of all things community based this month. I guess I should say thank you for not hassling me too much in my first month. As you can imagine, with the departure of our long-term chair, Richard, there is an awful lot of admin change and shifting around to be done, along with me trying to remember all the small tasks I should be remembering to do. It can be quite daunting. However, I will keep doing what I have in the past and will always be focused on good change and upkeep within our two villages.

As you know, the public open space on the Orchard Estate was finally handed over prior to Richard's departure, along with a substantial sum of money to enable us to maintain it for the next fifteen years. How we manage that will ensure that it will not impact on the precept hopefully for the foreseeable future, and ways of investing it wisely are being sought.

We have managed to get a £1000 Health & Wellbeing grant from TBC,

which will be used to begin forming a community garden on the Pennycress Estate pear tree land. Planting will be later in the year, as in these dry conditions any new shrubs would die pretty quickly. We hope it can become a quiet area to sit and draw breath! Any greenfingered residents close by who would like to potter there, please do so with the council's blessing.

The tennis nets are now up at the MUGA so please head down there and emulate your Wimbledon heroes. We are also looking at costs to replace the basketball hoop back-boards and any other maintenance issues.

I have heard today that we have finally secured the monies to allow us to go ahead with the pump track behind the MUGA, which we consulted on last year. This will be another big asset for our community and its children and will provide greater facilities & options for our kids and their exercise. Three quotes have been sourced and the best design will be approved at the next pc meeting.

On June 1st, we had a meeting with the M5 junction 10 team, at which our main concern was both the volume and speed of the traffic through both villages. Following on from the meeting we had had with them last year, they had come up with several mitigating ideas, such as crossing points, pavement widening, road surface marking; even average speed cameras. More information from them is being sought as to the most effective measures, which could reduce both the volume of traffic and their velocity.

Aside from that there is a constant stream of admin information, planning apps, and hall-related issues, that ensure there is never a dull moment to be had!

On a final note, the volunteers that are on the council, and that run the hall and shop, are often overwhelmed with the amount that needs done. It would be such a help if anyone who likes our lovely community and loves living here, could spare an hour from time to time, as there are so many little jobs to do especially around the hall.

Richard's Ramblings

Memories from 40 years on the Council.

Over the past 6 years or so I have covered all sorts of developments in the Parish. For such a small Parish of just over 2450 acres, we must have one of the most comprehensive utility and transport infrastructures in any rural Parish in the UK. In 1841, the main Birmingham to Gloucester railway line was the first major construction. The M5 cut the Parish in



half in 1969/70, followed quickly by a 36inch gas main from Milford Haven to Newcastle Upon Tyne, The 132,000 overhead Pylon Line from Boddington to Tewkesbury in 1974, a 24 inch water main the next year from Tewkesbury to the Harp Hill Reservoir supplying water for Cheltenham and making Dowdeswell Reservoir re-

dundant. Then when the 36 inch gas main was completed, an 11 inch and 8 inch main were laid from Fiddington to Cheltenham and back alongside the railway line. Since then we have had another 24 inch gas main adding to the National Gas Grid and a second 24 inch water main which is part of an interconnecting system nationwide as a back up in case of Emergency. our natural position within the County will never change, however, we can do our best to maintain quality of life.

In 1990, Councils were asked to carry out Village Appraisals—to which I have made reference in the past. It was really a forerunner of the Neighbourhood Development Plan allowing residents to have their say about the future of their Parish. The Committee was formed from Councillors and local residents and for some reason I was elected as Chairman.



It was, and still is, an interesting insight into the feelings of local residents about what they like and what upsets them about where they live. In true Stoke Orchard and Tredington fashion, out Appraisal was probably amongst the most comprehensive of any rural one of its type. We had 110 individual questions where as many considered 50 was ample!! We were very fortunate to have been sponsored or at least supported, by the Coal Board who employed one of their apprentices to ...

analyse all the results making graphs and pie charts using the comprehensive computer equipment and skills available at the CRE.

The Committee were formed and held their first meeting on the 27th November 1989. The Committee met on 32 occasions giving a total of 650 man hours in Committee with many more at home in preparation and analysis. It was interesting to note that the census of 1871 recorded a population of 238 in the two villages, By 1991 that figure had only risen to 329.

128 questionnaires were circulated on a household basis. With 117 being returned, 108 completed and usable. For this type of exercise, it was a very high percentage and showed the commitment of the Committee, the circulation teams and the residents to the whole project. The Subjects covered were varied from Housing and Future development, Parish Council, the Environment, Public Services, The Church, Utilities, Education and general items of interest within the Community. Niggles were microlights, the Tip, Bonfires and the Gun Club. Popular items included the list of Village events enjoyed by all.

It was agreed that it would be a working reference document for the different groups within the Community to act upon when they thought fit. So what was the outcome and what were the benefits achieved.

The need for the Village Hall to be updated was noted, but also a suggestion that a totally new building was needed to act as a Community Centre with a Community Bus and Shop. A request for a footpath to the School and also a School car park. Under Parish Council, a need for wider use of the Newsletter for better communication, footpath map on display in both villages, and a bungalow development for older people. A serious call for new social clubs, keep fit and associations from which the Gardening Club, the Bridge Club, the Village choir and extension of the Neighbourhood Watch scheme came about. The need for Children's Play areas was highlighted and a Youth Club. We now have all of the above except for the Youth Club. Ron Barlow and I ran the last youth Club in Tredington 40 years ago. We have all the facilities, we have the children, we might just manage a Youth Club again one day.

Dear Parents and Carers,

Our recent Parents Advisory Group meeting took place on Wednesday 21st of June and we had a full agenda ready for discussion. This Multi-Academy Trust has eight schools and is led by the Chief Executive Officer and governed by the Gloucestershire Learning Alliance Trust Board. In order to create a formal interface between parents and the Trust Board, the Trust runs 'Parent Advisory Groups' in each GLA Trust school. This group takes the place of the Local Governing Body for the school. The Parent Advisory Group will meet three times a year with the Head teacher and also a representative from the Trust Board. During the meetings, we plan to share ideas, information and proposals for the school as well as invite feedback on different aspects of the school and Trust from a parent and community perspective. Meetings will take place from 6pm - 8pm and will be held at Tredington Primary School. We were lucky enough to have four representatives who attended meetings this year, all of whom have supported over a two-year cycle and

will be reaching the end of their term. We are now looking to appoint new members to the team in preparation for the next academic year.

Speeding offences nationally have soared by 16 percent to a new eight -year high according to figures released recently by Churchill Motor Insurance. In Gloucestershire, convictions for speeding offences in 2022 rose 100% from 1,471 to 2,941. It's well established that speeding is a major factor in road traffic accidents and deaths (https://www.sciencedirect.com/science/article/pii/S2590198222001865)

Royal Society for the Prevention Of Accidents - Top Ten Tips to stay within the Speed Limit

Many car drivers unintentionally exceed the speed limit, often without realising it. Modern cars are so powerful and comfortable they give drivers little sensation of their speed. It is too easy to creep above the limit, and in particular, many drivers believe it is difficult to drive a modern car at no more than 30 mph on a road with a 30 mph limit. Drivers are responsible for the speeds at which they choose to drive, but there are some simple and practical things drivers who find it difficult to stay with speed limits can do to help themselves.

- 1. Check your speedometer regularly, especially when leaving high speed roads
- 2. Know the limits look for signs, especially at junctions
- 3. Assume lamp posts mean 30 mph, until signs say otherwise, but remember it could be 20 mph
- 4. Remember, speed limits are a maximum, not a target
- 5. 20's plenty when kids are about and may even be too fast
- 6. Try no higher than 3rd gear in a 30 mph limit
- 7. Recognise what makes you speed keeping up with traffic, overtaking or being tailgated
