Richard's Ramblings

Tour of Britain. September 9th 2023

I must be getting a little cynical in my old age—yes, I have been accused of that from time to time. All this sudden flurry of road im-


provements, like it was, just 12 months ago, when the peace of the villages was shattered by planers and tar spreaders working through the night to repair and relay our local highways.

The reason is on Saturday September 9th, the penultimate Stage 7, of this year's Tour of Britain



will dash through Parish and the road surface must be perfect.

The Stage will start from the Crescent in Tewkesbury at 11.00am and will wind its way along Barton Street, then the bwypass past Wheatpieces and up on to the A38. Just past the entrance to Southwick Farm, the Chief Marshall car will pull away from the cyclists and the days racing will start in full. Expect them in the villages from 11.05 - make sure you are ready early and do NOT plan to go by road anywhere for an hour or so either side! We shall be lucky to see





the riders jostling for early places and the whole 'peleton' in one stream will be a real sight to see.



Those of us who watched the riders dash down Cleeve Hill back in 2014 will remember the excitement and the atmos-

phere created by the dozens of team cars with spare bikes on the roof, police motor cycles clearing the roads and television cameras speeding by then suddenly, it was gone.

The route for our stage will give the riders some serious climbs uphill and very dangerous descents down as the race follow a tortuous route through the Cotswolds on their 106 ml stage 7.



The ride will take them up to Winchcombe, then a steep climbing on up to Guiting Power, across the scarp to Cirencester, Minchinhampton Common and the long haul to Tetbury and down to Yate. Then back up to Wotton Under Edge, the very steep climb up Cotswold Edge and on to the sharp drop down to Stroud and the final dash past Painswick to finish in Gloucester Docks around 3.00pm.—3.20pm.

Richard's Ramblings 95 (or 96 Not sure now!)

The Port of Gloucester.

Trying to find a new topic that is locally related becomes quite difficult when you reach in excess of 90 Rambles. When our Four was out training a few weeks ago, we boated at the new Gloucester Rowing Club Boat house on the Gloucester to Sharpness canal and rowed upstream towards the docks. Upstream I hear you ask? Yes the Gloucester to Sharpness canal actually flows, but we will come back to that later.

Elizabeth 1st granted Gloucester the status of a Customs Port in 1580 and it has been one of the furthest inland ports in the British Isles since that date. Here is a modern photo of the old Customs' House on the corner of Quay Street by Castlemeads. Sadly the building needs steel reinforcing now. For many years it was an Off-licence in the days before alcohol was on sale in shops

The main imports into Gloucester were timber and corn and the predominance of timber yards down the banks of the Sharpness Canal are still ample evi-

dence of the trade. I started with my row up-stream from the Gloucester Boathouse and after negotiating the Hempsted Bridge, now only for pedestrians but it still opens to allow barges to come through, we rowed along past Canada Wharf and the old timber yards of Price Walker, Griggs



Timber, Nicks Timber and so many others. "Canada Wharf"? Well most of the imported timber was shipped from Canada and my old school friend Chris Drury, at one time family owners of Nick's Timber, told me how they would have to raise many thousand of £'s to pay for the timber before it left Canada. Most of the

Timber yards had their own steam powered saws and the timber arrived in big baulks often stored under water in the canal to keep them moist until they were needed. Probably the most famous of those who stored their timber under the water were Morelands Matches. On the bend at the end of the Bristol road were massive beds where the timber lay until

It was brought into the factory on horse drawn drays at one time, to the factory opposite the Wagon works to be sliced into match sticks.

The massive warehouses in the Docks bear the names of millers

like Priday Metford who milled the corn in to bread and biscuit flour or stored it for transport onwards to the Midlands by rail. There were over 20 Corn merchants and millers at one time and in the mid 1800's over 350,000 tons (imperial) of foreign corn was imported through Gloucester



and up to 50,000 tons of Irish and British coastal imports. Our own Healings Mill in Tewkesbury was once the most modern flour mills in western Europe. It is so sad to see it empty and decaying now.

Of course, Gloucester Docks has been

the back drop of many films and such television standards as the Onedin line.

So lets go back to the Sharpness canal, does it flow? Yes it





does, there are a set of massive pumps on the west side of the main Docks basin which pump water up out of the Severn into the Canal. Thence it flows down the canal to a point above Sharpness where it is pumped to Bristol for their water supply. Sadly, this has caused a serious expense in the last few years as the pumps brought a great deal of silt up into the docks which is having to be dredged up and taken down the canal by barge. The Docks and the Canal at Saul Junction

are well worth a visit. Saul Junction is where the Stroud Water Canal branches off to link with the Thames and this canal is under reconstruction. I will come back to that on the next Ramble as that is also worthy of a visit and the visitor centre offers canal rides.


August Update:

Speed is a critical issue for the safety of our roads – no one was ever killed by a stationary vehicle. Speeding traffic can also make our communities noisier and more polluted, discouraging walking and cycling. BRAKE https://www.brake.org.uk/

Why speed matters?

Speed can be the difference between life and death. The speed a vehicle is travelling dictates whether or not a driver will be able to stop in time to avoid a crash and, if they can't stop, the force of the impact when they crash.

Breaking the speed limit (or travelling too fast for conditions) is recorded by police at crash scenes as a contributory factor in around a third of all fatal crashes and a quarter of crashes resulting in serious injury



However, it is important to remember that speed is always a contributory factor to a road crash.

Whether or not a vehicle is judged to have been speeding, the fact it was involved in a collision means it was going too fast to have stopped in time.

Towns, villages and cities should be places where people are free to make safe and healthy journeys. Unfortunately, in many places in the UK, inappropriate speed limits and a lack of safe places to walk and cycle away from traffic, make movement dangerous, particularly for vulnerable road users, including children and the elderly.

For people to make safe and healthy journeys where they live, they need:


- Safe footpaths and cycle paths, separated from motorised traffic
- Safe places to cross roads
- Slow traffic
- Clean traffic
