On 4th and 11th January, members of the CSW team braved the cold weather to conduct the first speed monitoring sessions of 2024. On the first occasion, the team were joined by two PSCOs Ben Taylour and trainee Cody Dokic.

The results (7% and 8% travelling above 35 mph) suggest that the CSW activity continues to make an impact on driver behaviour. Please help us to reduce speeding in the villages by driving within the speed limit which slows other drivers.

Remember that Rural Lanes are not Motorways. Drive within Stopping Distance of what is in view.

Dear Resident,

January is an odd month after all the furore of Christmas and the New Year. Being a Scot though, I have "Burns nicht" on 25th January to look forward to. I can never say I'm going to do 'dry January', as that would be a slur on the bard's name!

So, what has been going on this month...

- The Roseleigh development is still with Tewkesbury Borough Council's planning department, and the pc were asked to submit our farther response to their updated application. This is now on TBC's planning portal.
- We had a meeting with Cotswold Oak Ltd on 10th Jan to ascertain the physical position of both the sewerage pipes under the PC land and with the pavement they are going to lay. We had raised some concerns about the road crossing on the junction. We have asked if it's possible to delineate the crossing to make it safer, as Highways have agreed it's position. The undergrowth being cut down will be replanted and I asked if they would supply a 'community Christmas tree', that we could plant somewhere!

- We welcome back our parish clerk after her maternity leave (Congratulations)! Our appreciative thanks go to Ms Jules Owen for holding the fort. A staffing meeting with Shelley was held to discuss the most efficient way forward for us all.
- Nothing yet on the Land by the Chapel. I am waiting to hear from our solicitor on progress.
- The pump track had a full 'ecologist visit on the 16th Jan, in order to satisfy farther requests from the planning department. We await the ecologists report, and I can submit it.
- The Junction 10 team have completed farther surveys we requested, and we are trying to arrange a meeting of all bodies concerned Highways, Borough & County Councils, police and ourselves to try to get the best mitigatory package as a result of this scheme.
- The enclosure for the bee hives was built thanks go to James Gilder, Gordon Webber, Richard Chatham & Paul Hazell for their help. Two bee hives have now been homed within and come spring and summer, do look out for the most local honey you will ever taste, which will be on sale in the Orchard Stores.
- We've been having to do our sums (headache inducing), to come
 up with a realistic budget with which to service the Parish. This
 will form part of the precept we all have to pay to TBC. With the
 increases in everything across the board over the last year, this is
 proving challenging, but we will try to be savvy & parsimonious.
- Highways came and tidied up the stretch of hedging opposite Waterloo Farm. However, the ditch wasn't cleared properly, and the fence was damaged. We are harrying Highways to make good and clear. The bridle path aptly called 'Watery Lane', abutting the Orchard Estate leading to the pumping station, has also been pinned down to a Highways responsibility, and has now been raised as a clearing/pruning job. Lots more but no more space!

Richard's Ramblings 2024 What a Tip!

Well over 50 years ago, Dad came back from a Parish Council meeting and told us that the County Council were planning on opening a Landfill Site on the far side of the Airfield at Stoke Orchard. The Parish Council fought against it but the County Council won the day—not too surprising. The expected life of the Tip as we know it was 26 years. When the 26 years was up it was only half full and also in places parts were being re-opened to put more fresh rubbish on top of old, as the earlier had settled, started to decay and produce methane. Three giant generators were installed, powered by the methane, to produce electricity for the National Grid—and they still do to this day.



The management of the Wingmoor Farm Landfill Area is in a total different league from the early days. At one time pools of leachate threaten to turn the Swilgate bright green, but when one remembers the Cess Pit overflow down the old Mill run alongside Fiddington Lane, it would not have been the first time!! However,

in my Council career I sat on the Coal Board Liaison Committee and the Wingmoor Farm liaison Committee and believe you me, things have changed dramatically on for the better.

Last Monday I joined a group of friends to tour the new EFW (Electricity from Waste) unit at Morton Valence, alongside J12 on the M5 and on the old Gloster Aircraft Factory site. What a strange coincidence with Stoke Orchard—two satellite airfield Factories from the days of Gloster Aircraft bonded once more by waste!

RAF Morton Vallence was, like RAF Stoke Orchard, built in 1939 and was originally designated a back up for RAF Staverton. However, there were great similarities with RAF Stoke Orchard as the Gloster Aircraft company extended its use to Moreton Valence at the same time it built Sheds 39 and 40 at Stoke.



Similarities continue as initially it was also the home of an Elementary Flying School and later the home of 83 Glider Squadron RAF after the RAF had taken over the training of pilots for the Glider Pilots Regiment from the Army Flying Corp.

Whilst Gloster assembled the Hurricane and Typhoon at Stoke Orchard, they used Moreton Valence - due to the extended concrete runway for testing the Gloster EE588 or better know to us as the Gloster Meteor, the first jet engine aircraft flown by the Allies in WWII. The Gloster Javelin was to follow and assembly was at Moreton Valence. The test pilot for the Javelin, one Bill Waterton, who is remembered by us in Stoke Orchard in Waterton Close, once said about the Javelin after it became uncontrollable as it neared the speed of sound, this aircraft will kill somebody one day!! We also other Test Pilots - Zurakowski - better known as "Zura", the man who invented the aerial cartwheel and Eric "Greenwood" The Gloster chief test pilot who was the first person to exceed 600 MPH in Meteor! That long runway, it is the straight section of the M5 south of Junction 12!

I digress, well that is part of my Ramblings, you all know that. I want to take you inside this amazing building and give you some idea of what it does and how it works. The size and capacity of this unit is mind blowing but like the fight our Parish Council put up, this EFW unit was not univer-



sally welcomed when it was first suggested. I want to take you inside and give you an idea not only of the capacity of this unit but also the scientific level of safety controls on the management and more importantly the safety of the emissions of this 21st century Leviathan.

The rubbish arrives by lorry, some are local refuse wagons that have collected locally, but much like the rubbish from our area, is tipped locally at a waste transfer station and then arrives in 25 tonne loads in articulated lorries. Before we go any further, let me explain that the unit is working 24/7, 49 weeks a year. (except for any emergency repairs. Maintenance.)



The other three weeks of the year, it is cooled for essential maintenance and overhauls. Therefore, whilst waste vehicles only tip standard day working hours—8.00am—5.00pm the plant continues to burn and produce electricity 24 hours a day.

All vehicles are weighed 1. on the way in and out to get the weight of the rubbish imported. The lorries now tip in area 2 where the rubbish drops into the waste bunker—area 3. in this area two fully automated grabs mix up to 3000 tonnes of waste 24/7 and load the furnace from the top. The furnace 4 has air blow-



ers top and bottom, a bit like an old forge furnace and maintains the

temperature around 1000 degrees centigrade to ensure all dangerous material and gases are totally incinerated. The furnace is on a slope and the material is encouraged down the slope by a series of flaps which activate automatically to

maintain the flow. The Boiler sits on top of the Furnace. And is heated by the flue gases which pass over the and under the furnace.

The system works in a very similar way to any of the wonderful Stanier or Churchward (Castle Class) steam locos that ran on the GWR and LMS railway lines just 1200 yards away as they raced each other to see who could claim the platform at Gloucester Station first. I mention Sir William Stanier as he went to Wycliffe College in Stonehouse, well so did we as a family!! The fire heats the air which run the flues that heat the water in the boiler, 4 and then through the superheater tubes

and the steam at over 400 degrees powers the pistons or in this the case the turbine that runs Elin the generator **5** (gennies always have ladies names!) Elin produces the electricity to the run the whole unit and enough besides to power the equivalent of 25,000 homes.



So, what about the dirty gases and the waste from the fire. That takes me back to my earlier comment about scientific controls. The superheated steam is cooled and condensed and returns to the boiler to be heated again. The Flue gases go through a series of cleaning systems where lime and activated carbon are used reduce the acidity and filter out dangerous toxins, (the sort of things you smell when plastic is burned,) then the cleaned gases are filtered to remove any solid particles and exit via the chimney stack! The spent lime and carbon filters are safely removed to hazardous waste tip out of County!

So what about the burned residue, Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) which comes from the combustion grate and comprises inert aggregates, ceramics, glass, clinker, and some metals. The IBA is cooled using collected water from the site, before being processed to recover the metals, and then graded as a construction aggregate. The metals, are removed for recycling, except for the occasional lucky find which is kept upstairs in Reception as a sort of museum which include all sorts of matter from a sewing machine to horse shoe!!

The equipment in here is designed to burn our waste that at one time ended up in a continuous stream of lorries tipping at Wingmoor Farm. The annual capacity is 190,000 tons of waste. Each year in this County we produce some 130,000 tonnes of domestic un-recyclable waste so the extra capacity is made up with local commercial waste.

I admit I could Ramble about this forever, it was a fascinating trip and I admit that the EFW is a big leap forward from the Tip!!

Stoke Orchard and Tredington Flood Warden's Report.

The recent high rainfall and subsequent flooding in the Severn-vale and other parts of the Country has naturally raised concerns about flooding in our own Parish. The difference has been this time was that in 2007, we had the high rainfall and our flooding was Pluvial (rainfall). The last few weeks, the flooding has been Fluvial (River Levels). We could see the river levels rise on the gauges from Shrewsbury on the Severn and Warwick/Stratford on the Avon. While these level gauges gave those liable to river flooding some time to prepare, flooding in one's property is always devastating.

For the last two years, we have had the benefit of our own River level gauges on the Dean at Stoke Orchard and on



level gauges on the Dean at Stoke Orchard and on the Swilgate at Tredington Bridge which have been extremely useful in recording the horrendous speed of storm water from the Cleeve and Cheltenham areas. Prompted by our own gauges, we now have a new Environment Agency Gauge on the Swilgate at Tredington which is available for all to check. So how do you find the levels on the web.!

The levels in Cheltenham will arrive in Tredington around 90 minute later. I use it to warn of impending flooding or to confirm we are safe.
