Happy Easter

'... I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.' John 10:10

For the past few weeks, life has begun to spring up all around us. First the snowdrops, then the daffodils, and now the crocuses are adding their colours to all the different greens of the new leaves on trees and shrubs. There is an Easter hymn that very aptly includes this in its words: 'Now the green blade riseth from the buried grain, Wheat that in dark earth many days has lain; Love lives again, that with the dead has been; Love is come again like wheat that springeth green.'

If you have given something up during Lent, or taken up some kind of Lent practice, or life has been difficult for one reason or another, you may well have experienced for yourself some sort of 'dark earth' by way of need, emptiness, hunger, unfulfilled desire, grief, or lack. And yet, this Easter hymn says confidently that in that same dark earth, wheat has lain... The hymn writer may have meant it differently, but I always think the wheat is synonymous to hope and light. Hope and light may be buried within the darkness and heaviness of our circumstances and emotions, but nevertheless they are still within us, somewhere, until we are ready and able for them to reappear in our life.

When Jesus died on the cross, everyone thought it was all over. All the hope and light had gone. And then, in the depths of grief and despair, Jesus appeared - hope and light were present again. And that, I believe, is the message of Easter: death is not the end, but points to and contains new beginnings. Whether we call it wheat or hope or light or life, whether we can see and notice it or not, it is there, and is reflected every year in the cycle of church and seasonal celebrations. Every year again, we move through darkness and winter and apparent death into hope and light and new life.

This prayer, which will be used in the churches on Easter Day, says it all: God of glory, by the raising of your Son you have broken the chains of death and hell: fill your Church with faith and hope; for a new day has dawned and the way to life stands open in our Saviour Jesus Christ.'

May life be full of hope and light and new beginnings, and peace and blessings to you all this Eastertide,

Dear Resident,

I think we're all looking forward to a bit of warmth, and for the interminable wet to abate. Roll on less mud!

So, what has been going on this month...

• The Junction 10 application has now been resubmitted. On Wednesday 27th, we have a meeting with them, the police, the County councillor, Alex Hegenbarth, Highways and TBC to discuss traffic calming measures that all parties might think is appropriate for the road through our Parish. These discussions will take on an added importance, with the application adjacent to Spitfire Homes in Bishops Cleeve for an industrial estate opposite Grundons. The heavy traffic generated by this will impact on an already busy road, and no doubt some of these will attempt to come through our village. This is not to mention the displacement of yet more flood water downstream towards us. A written submission by us objecting to this estate will be sent to the planning department before the 28th deadline.

- Cotswold Oak Ltd have apologised to residents for the mud outside their site.
- The Land by the Chapel: the letter of transfer has now been signed and in the hands of TBC. The lawyers are now finalising the transfer conditions and arranging the agreed payment to the PC for it's future maintenance & upkeep.
- The TBC planning department have now come back with another load of requests and conditions relating to the ecology of the pump track site. The ecologist now has to come back and another survey performed. This means I suspect that early April was a bit ambitious, but we will keep plugging away until we get there!
- Regarding the littering around the Parish, I wanted to thank our residents, John Cooper & his son, and Roy & Maggie Dakin for their much-appreciated help in keeping the village tidy. We would still like to do a volunteer Sunday at some point, when a day becomes free. Meantime, there are Hi-Viz vests and litter grabbers at the community centre if anyone would like to help also.
- On Wednesday last, a number of volunteers helped transform The Orchard Stores with a complete change around. There is now a dedicated coffee area, where we hope eventually to do hot soup & crusty bread, hot pasties and delicious cake. Do come and give it a try.
- Kompan, the company who installed the playpark attended this month also, to check the equipment and to retighten the zipwire. It is so well used and a great asset to our village.
- Some of the parish hedges are a little untidy at the mo. Sadly we now cannot trim them until end of August due to nesting birds. However, we will tackle all these then.
- Finally, we are pursuing all the relevant authorities regarding the bridge in Tredington, which has had unsightly barriers in place for a long time now. The bridge itself is not fit for purpose and we are determined to try to remedy this.

'CLICK' campaign is running for 6 weeks from March to April 2024

Car occupants not wearing a seat belt are over twice as likely to be killed or seriously injured in a collision, emphasising the life-saving impact of this simple act.

Seat belt non wearing is more common amongst those that live in the UK's most deprived areas and those that travel in passenger seats.

The proportion of passenger car occupant fatalities recorded as not wearing a seat belt rose from 16% in 2013 to 22% in 2022 (highest at 37% in 2021).


Non wearing is also associated with drink and drug driving, aggressive driving and driving at night.

Why focus on 17-24-year-old men?

In 2022, 30% of car occupant fatalities among 17 to 29-year-olds occurred without seat belts (vs 21% among all car occupants).

Young men, who are more likely to be inconsistent wearers of seatbelts, report that they are much less likely to wear one on familiar journeys or at low speeds. Around 40% think it is less risky to travel without a seat belt on shorter and familiar journeys (vs 12% of the general population).
