I have started doing longer walks again, and recently picked up a copy of the book 'On this holy island. A modern pilgrimage across Britain' by Oliver Smith. This book neatly complements the other book I already have, 'Pilgrim Pathways. 1-2 day walks on Britain's ancient sacred ways' by Andy Bull. You may have read the book or seen the film 'Salt Path' in which a couple set off on the Southwest Coast Path after losing their house and most of their possessions.

Pilgrimage walking is definitely in the public eye. People of all faiths and none walk either on their own or in groups, following ancient pilgrim routes, visiting churches and cathedrals and holy places as they go. Some walk for leisure and pleasure, others walk because it's a way to feel closer to God or the Divine, or to spend some much needed time in silence or prayer or contemplation. And of course we have our very own pilgrimage path from Tewkesbury to Stoke Orchard to Deerhurst and back to Tewkesbury, which is proving very popular.

But it's not all about walking and holy places. The Oliver Smith book also tells of pilgrimages by train (from Wells-next-to-Sea to Walsingham, by way of a miniature railway); to a pub in Inverie, Scotland; and to Hillsborough Stadium, a football stadium.

"Pilgrimage is about stepping out of your routine into another space... It gives you an opportunity to reflect and to get things back in order in life" (On this holy island, page 174). We all need that opportunity at times. And whether you step out on foot, by train, by boat, or bus; whether you walk along the Severn for a mile or hike from here to Santiago de Compostela; whether your end point is a cathedral, the local churchyard, a meadow down the road, a pub, or a stadium; whether you want to meet fellow pilgrims or be on your own; whether you spend time praying or deep in thought or listening to the birdsong, pilgrimage is for everyone everywhere. What will your pilgrimage look like?

LEST WE FORGET...

In these times of uncertainty and disappointment with humanity, and in the year that marks the 80th anniversary of the victory over the Nazis, we all should focus on the majority of us all that want good lives and not the minority who strive to ruin it through financial greed, ego or power grabbing. Of course, there are some unsung exceptional people whose stories should be told.

Such a person was a 98-year-old lady named Irena Sendler who died a few years ago. During World War 2, Irena, got permission to work in the Warsaw Jewish Ghetto, as a health advisor and specialist. She had an 'ulterior motive', she KNEW what the Nazi's plans were for the Jews, (being of German nationality and not Jewish.) In the course of her supposed job, Irena smuggled infants and small children out in the bottom of the toolbox she carried and in the back of her truck she kept a burlap sack to shoulder-carry larger kids. She also had a dog in the back that she trained to bark when the Nazi soldiers let her in and out of the ghetto. The soldiers of course wanted nothing to do with the dog, letting Irena in and out as the dog demanded and the barking covered the infant's noises.

During her time of doing this, she managed to smuggle out and save 2500 children or infants. The children were given false identities and placed in homes, orphanages and convents. Irena Sendler carefully noted, in coded form, the children's original names and their new identities. She kept the only record of their true identities in jars buried beneath an apple tree in a neighbour's back yard, across the street from German barracks, hoping she could someday dig up the jars, locate the children and inform them of their past.

But the Nazis became aware of Irena's activities, and on October 20, 1943, she was arrested, imprisoned and tortured by the Gestapo, who broke her feet and legs. She ended up in the notorious Pawiak Prison, but no one could break her spirit. Though she was the only one who knew the names and addresses of the families sheltering the Jewish children, she withstood the torture that crippled her for life refusing to betray either her associates or any of the Jewish children in hiding. Sentenced to death, Irena was saved at the last minute when Zegota partisan members bribed one of the Gestapo agents to halt the execution. She escaped from prison but for the rest of the war she was pursued by the Nazis.

After the war she dug up the jars and used the notes to track down the 2,500 children she placed with adoptive families and to reunite them with relatives scattered across Europe. Sadly, most had lost their families during the Holocaust in Nazi death camps. The children had known her only by her code name Jolanta. But years later, after she was honoured for her wartime work, her picture appeared in a newspaper. "A man, a painter, telephoned me," said Sendler, "I remember your face,' he said. It was you who took me out of the ghetto.' I had many calls like that!" Irena Sendler did not think of herself as a hero. She claimed no credit for her actions. "I could have done more," she said. "This regret will follow me to my death."

Irena was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize ... She was not selected.

Their memory should live on.



Roy Troughton

1942 - 2025

Roy came to live in Tredington in November 1971 after he married Vivienne. In 1973 they moved into Tredington Court, a house which has been in the family since 1953, but the farm land attached to the house has been farmed by the

Troughton family since the early 1920s.



Besides his family, one of Roy's main passions was a love of classic cars, particularly his 1930 Rolls-Royce, which he bought in the 1960s for £150! For the next 20 years, it was stored away, awaiting restoration. The day came when he spotted in the automobile magazine a Gurney nutting body, age appropriate to his car.

Over the next 20 years, Roy could be found lovingly bringing his Rolls back to its former glory, restoring it in time for him to drive his daughter Nicky, to her wedding in 2007. To the Rolls was added a 1952 Alvis (a grey lady), a 1954 Austin 10, and a 1972 XJ6.

Roy was a faithful member of our two churches and was Church warden at Tredington for 15 years. He carried on doing the job without the title until January this year and along with Frank Juckes mowed Tredington Church yard for decades.

He was a kind, quiet, gentle man and without fuss would do any job required of him at both churches and in the village, only bowing out of the mowing last July aged 82.

Tredington Court is a family home and over the years many fundraising events took place there, especially for the Friends of Tredington and Stoke Orchard churches, the WI and numerous Concerts. The quiet man was used to many people coming into his home!

He had a love of nature and the countryside, planting two woodland areas back in the 70s and 80s, and interesting trees at Tredington Court. (Wellingtonia, Gingko, Medlar, Foxglove tree, Indian bean and Handkerchief tree).

Roy was a practical man and a great problem solver. He was content with his life, rarely complained but found the speed of modern life and technology (especially the mobile phone) a little challenging!

After a diagnosis of cancer in the lining of his right kidney last August, life slowed down but he stayed at peace and accepted his limitations.

Roy died on Saturday, May 24 with his family around him and they were all blessed by being able to share Holy Communion together, with Ilse our vicar, a few hours before he 'slipped away'.

A celebration of his life will take place at Deerhurst Church (a church he had always attended before moving to Tredington) on Friday the 4th of July at 2:30pm.

All who knew him would be most welcome.


